


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From the MD's Desk





pure amalaam of colourful culture, rich heritage, and lip-smacking food. One can never get too much of anything here. While exploring a destination as beautiful as this, it would be a cardinal sin to miss out on its unique food. The state's cuisine is something that will amaze you with its simple, yet relishing flavours. It is a rich mixture of Nepalese, Tibetan, and home-made Sikkimese dishes. This blend of cultures results in a cuisine that soothes the taste buds and leaves one craving for more.



GYAKHO

Popularly known as the 'chimney soup', gya kho is a hearty meat stew served with an assortment of vegetables. Originally a Tibetan delicacy, it is now very much a part of Sikkimese cuisine. Its name comes from the bowl it is typically served in, which resembles a coal chimney. In fact, traditional aya kho

serving bowls come with a place for holding coals that keep the stew warm and give it a unique taste.



Sikkimese people are known for their fermented dishes and sinki is one of the most popular ones. This pickled dish of finely sliced radishes makes for a wonderful side to momos, steamed rice, or any vegetable/meat dish It may take as long as a month for sinki to reach the fermentation stage after which it stays good for almost a year! It is also used as a flavour enhancer while making soups, stews, and salad dressings.

EROMBA

Another tempting accompaniment, eromba is made with potatoes, bamboo shoots, and fermented fish. It comes together with the addition of seasonings and a whole lot of chilli. *Eromba* is commonly served with lunch and dinner but can also be enjoyed with a

piece of bread for a simple snack.

SMOKED PORK WITH BAMBOO SHOOTS

This dish is an amalaamation of delicious local bamboo shoot and pork, which is a commonly available and key ingredient in many Sikkimese delicacies. It is mostly made dry to be enjoyed as an appetizer or a side with local bread or sticky rice. This combo is popular because it is not only delicious but also keeps you warm when the temperature dips.



GYUMA

The Sikkimese version of chorizo sausage, gyuma, is made from minced beef, fat, beef blood, and spices. Yes, you read that right! Gyuma is a blood sausage with its origins in Tibet. The final product has a dark reddish or black colour that may look ominous, but it is known to be very delicious. This is

undoubtedly a must-try for those who are not afraid to try new things!



SAFI ROTI

What better way to end a meal in Sikkim than with a local dessert! The sael roti is a close cousin of the usual ring-shaped doughnuts but made of fermented rice batter. It is typically deep-fried and then dusted with sugar for sweetness. Sael roti is a common and popular sweet served during festivals and other occasions, and is loved by the locals. Pair these dishes with some jaanr, chaana, or tongba, the local fermented alcoholic beverages and get ready for a good time in Sikkim.




CALANGUTE BEACH - KABHI HAAN KABHI NAA

Located about 15 km from the capital, Calangute Beach is the largest in North Goa and instantly brings back memories of the Shah Rukh Khan and Suchitra Krishnamurthy starrer, Kabhi Haan Kabhi Naa. The popular, finger-snapping song, Anna Mere Pyaar Ko Na was extensively shot here and showcased the vibrant local culture with its colours and music. Every year, thousands of tourists visit this beautiful beach. Though the peak season is the week between Christmas and

New Year, the summer months o April and May are also a great time to soak in the sun on its sands. Dotted with food shacks and side-by-side sun lounges, it is the ideal place to unwind with seafood and chilled beer Whether you are the laid-back traveller who prefers watching the sun set or the adrenaline junkie who seeks the thrill of water sports, you are sure to have a memorable time here.

CHAPORA FORT - DIL CHAHTA HAI

Farhan Akhtar's directorial debut, the popular coming-of-age movie about three friends, Dil Chahta Hai, beautifully captures the expanse and enigma of this rustic structure. When the movie released in 2001, this instantly became the favourite photo spot especially with the younger generation; so much so that Chapora Fort is often referred to as 'Dil Chahta Hai Fort'. Perched atop a hill about 700 metres from Vagator Beach, it offers breathtaking views of the sunset.



The best time to visit is early morning or late afternoon. Like the protagonists in the movie, you can sit here in silence for hours on end, staring at the horizon where the Arabian Sea meets the sky.

BASILICA OF BOM JESUS -RANGEELA

Arguably Ram Gopal Verma's only successful romantic, light-hearted movie, Rangeela was shot at various locations in Goa. The popular song Tanha Tanha from the film was shot at Anjuna Beach, which is a short drive from Basilica of Bom Jesus (read good Jesus). Located in Old Goa and exhibiting some of India's best baroque architecture, the church is a

must-visit. One can also see the mortal remains of St. Francis Xavier, Goa's patron saint, at this shrine. Moreover, it is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and has many religious exhibits and relics such as statues of saints, pristine gold altars and artistic murals.

Anjuna Beach also hosts a flea market every Saturday and Wednesday—a souvenir paradise where you can buy everything from jewellery and clothes to food items and other knick-knacks. Scenes from the film were also shot at St. Caietan Church, which is located in Assagao village, about 6 km from Aniuna Beach. The church has a large dome with Latin inscriptions from the Bible and seven altars of which one is dedicated to St. Cajetan.





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ome of the best, recent overhead photographs admired the world over were probably snapped by a drone, as this quadcopter is able to reach places considered nigh inaccessible. Getting a drone is only the first step in capturing stunning overhead pictures and panoramas. This quick guide can offer some handy tips to help you make the most of this amazing piece of machinery that is fast becoming the go-to tool when it comes to aerial photography.

A View From the Top. A great aerial picture that was previously

inaccessible to most common folks can now be had with the use of a drone as this innovative technique is rapidly capturing the fascination of many. Ashwin Rajagopalan



Drones come in many sizes, shapes, power capacities, and range, among other features. those with built-in cameras and start with a cheaper drone till you master the art.

FLYING A DRONE

This will take some learning for beginners. Newbies will find lighter drones easier to control but look for one that is light, yet sturdy. Study the features to understand if they match your needs. Battery life and flying range are among the important considerations.

There are strict restrictions and regulations across India—drones are banned in most public places. Respect the law and restrict use within private confines or in zones where drones are allowed. It is the same when you travel abroad; check local laws before you start shooting with your drone.

ACCESSORISE

Make sure you have enough battery back-up. Drones typically come with 10 to 30 minutes of flight time, which can be inadequate on a day when you have much to shoot. The same goes for storage, so ensure you have adequate space on the camera's storage, especially when you are shooting 4K videos. A thumb rule is to have spares for everything in order to avoid

disappointment later. Other useful accessories include an extra set of propellers and propeller guard.

PRE-PREP

In many ways, drone photography is more dependent on external conditions. It is good to go through a thorough prephotography checklist that can also include a test run to make sure you are good to go. You can tweak the camera settings based on the weather and the available light.

CAPTURING IMAGES

The first thing to remember is that you are not going to take breathtaking images from day one. Give yourself time to learn to shoot with a drone. Get started with the basic tools like smartphone feed that allows you to view on your phone's screen what the drone is capturing. Remember to apply the same basic photography rules (like the rule of thirds) as you start, and then start improvising.

Overhead photography brings another set of perspectives; once you have your basics in place, start looking for these. Symmetry is one of the things to look for you could discover wonderful patterns while shooting a large

HOW TO GET ONE

But the most basic segregation is those without, which allows users to attach their own camera like a GoPro. Opt for the latter since this will give you more control over the quality of images. It is advisable to



instance a container yard or rows of townhouses) that add up to make unique images.

Just like other images, you can rely on image editing tools like Photoshop or Snapseed to add some last minute magic. And of course, do not forget to enjoy shooting; that is probably the most important rule in photography.

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Glassmaking in Murano

To witness the ancient Roman art of glassblowing, catch the vaporetto line 42 from Piazza San Marco that takes you to the island of Murano. The island with its beautiful sidewalk cafes presents a quieter and laid–back side of Venice. Head to a glassblowing factory and sit through a demonstration. The glass being shaped into various fascinating forms by a master artisan is an enjoyable experience. Pick up a souvenir or two at the end of your visit.



Wander the alleys

One of the top things to do in Venice is to get wonderfully lost in its back alleys. Everywhere you turn, there is a stunning photograph waiting to be captured. So put away your map, and allow the city to surprise you. This is also the best way to get a glimpse into the local life and Venice's colourful architecture. (Do not worry about getting lost; this is only an island, so you will eventually get back to where you started).



St. Mark's Square

This is Venice's main square and prime attraction. Arrive as early as you can to enjoy the square in all its grandeur, minus the crowd.

Head straight to Campanile de San Marco (The Bell Tower) to get a panoramic view of Venice. The view of St. Mark's Basilica, the Grand Canal, and Venice stretch out across small islands from the tower is a breathtaking sight. The entrance to Bell Tower costs approximately 8 euros per person.

After a good half an hour, walk into the St. Mark's Basilica where the remains of St. Mark the Apostle is buried. This ornate religious landmark stands as a testimony to the city's power and dominance of the past. This is no more evident than in the Basilica's glittering ceiling mosaics made of 24-carat gold. Its blend of Renaissance, Gothic, Romanesque, and Byzantine architectures is a treat for those who appreciate architecture styles.

diaries traversing from one hill station to another, there are sure to be several highs along the journey Darjeeling and Gangtok are about 98 km away from each other and though it may not feel like a long distance, the route is marked by treacherous turns and spectacular vistas that call for slow driving and lots of savouring. Prepare to be welcomed by mist, stop for photographs, and simply get out to breathe the fresh mountain air throughout this gargeous road trip.

THE PATH A good route to opt for is via NH 55 which navigates its way through Ghum and then meanders alongside the Teesta river to eventually pass through the towns of Rangpo and Singtam to reach Gangtok. Cloudy weather is common and during the rains, the area is prone to landslides and this must be considered while driving through the region. A good idea would be to

work enough buffer time space into one's itinerary to ensure the onward plan in Gangtok is not compromised. There are several hamlets alona



the way that offer small restaurants and shops serving noodles, momos, and curry.

A WELCOME DETOUR One can also make a small detour on the route and drive via Kalimpong. This can be done by heading eastwards from Teesta toward Kalimpong and then moving on toward Gangtok. This route treats visitors to magnificent views of the Kanchenjunga. No matter where one looks, its looming presence is felt. Make sure to stop by for some photographs with the mountain in the background. This detour will add about 45
